Borders and Boundaries

Border: often called political border, the official line separating two countries or provinces or territories

National Border: the official line separating two countries, one country on each side of the line, marking the limits of each country

Boundary: a line marking the limits of an area, often follows the path of the political border, the official line separating two countries or provinces or territories, but is often a natural boundary, e.g. the Great Lakes form part of the boundary between Canada and the United States
